## What is it about?

South Dublin Arts & Disability Project is running a **Training Programme** for art workers & artists interested in working with disabled people.

The Programme will be delivered through specifically designed modules by disabled and non-disabled artists. Course trainers have proven years of experience in working with disabled people in various cultural settings.

## Why become involved?

South Dublin Arts & Disability Programme will promote *effective* access to community arts and artist in the community activities *for & with* local people with disabilities.

Graduates will return to their communities and promote the inclusion of people with disabilities in the design & delivery of arts activities.

## Can 'I' be a participant?

The Training Programme is aimed at South Dublin art workers & artists who are facilitating arts and cultural activities in various communities.

The Training Programme is particularly interested to attract disabled artists and art workers as participants.

Programme participants will come from organisations that use art to facilitate community arts and/or artist in the community activities in South Dublin area.

## What will 'I' be able to do?

Graduates who successfully complete the training will acquire the skills needed to promote the effective participation of people with disabilities in the design and delivery of local art process and products.

It is envisaged that the graduates from the Training Programme will have a portfolio of work which will be accredited at the end of the Course by a 3<sup>rd</sup> level body.

## What will 'I' have to do?

The Training Programme will end in Spring 2009 when participants will be required to design, deliver and facilitate introductory arts workshops involving disabled people in various South Dublin community and cultural settings.

## What's the start date?

The Training Programme will start in September 2008 and finish in May 2009. There are only 18 participant places on the Course.

If you are interested in becoming a Course participant, you must complete an application form that should be submitted by May 30<sup>th</sup> 2008.

Applicants will then be selected for participation via Course taster workshop to be held on June 9<sup>th</sup> 2008 at Stewarts Hospital (10am to 1pm).

The workshop participants will then be required to attend a 20 minute individual interview to be held on either June 10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup>.

All applicants will be informed by the end of June 2008 as to whether they have secured a place on the course.
